Mayor Rodman is working with the City Attorney on the charging stations by Green Spot. There will be a meeting on May 2, 2022 with SETDD Beth Jones.



Meth Street Prices' Effect On Addiction

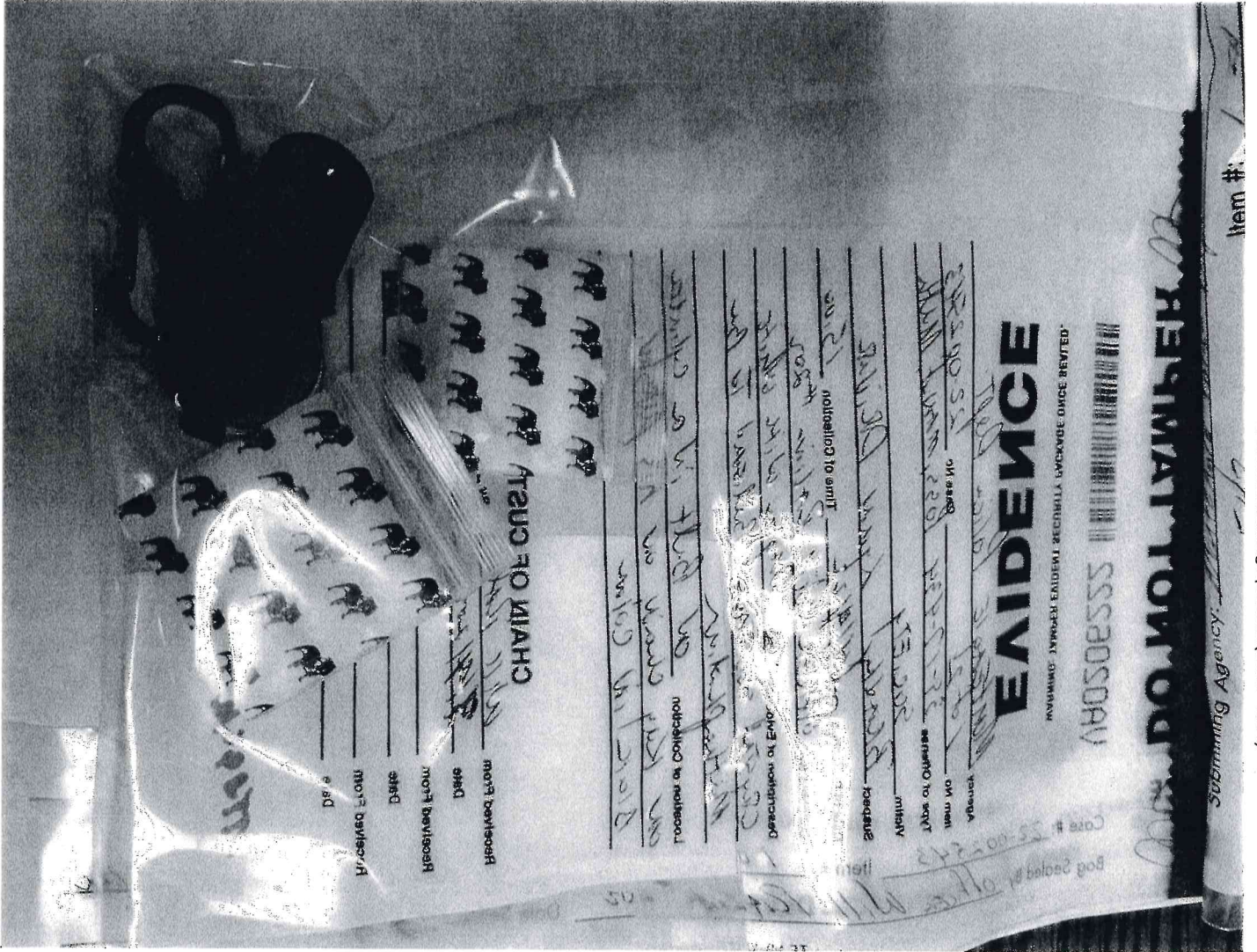
Another, more powerful Stimulant, Methamphetamines have been shown to release 4 times as much dopamine as Cocaine. Although Meth "cook" times are longer, drug trafficking organizations can generate more profit in a shorter amount of time. While extremely hazardous to make, most Meth found in the US today comes from drug cartels to the south. Border patrol agents reportedly seize 10 to 20 times more Meth today than they did 10 years ago – typically hidden aboard vehicles trying to cross border checkpoints.

We're seeing a lot of longtime addicts who used crack cocaine switch to meth. You ask them about it, and they'll say: 'Hey, it's half the price, and it's good quality.'

Today, a single hit of Meth (sometimes called Crystal Meth, depending on its formation) costs about \$5 and is almost 100% pure. Consequently, in much of rural America and the West, people are dying of Meth-related overdose at nearly twice the rates of Heroin-related overdose. Because most develop a tolerance to its effects in a short period of time, some who have used Meth describe smoking as much as a "teener" per day (about 1.75 grams).

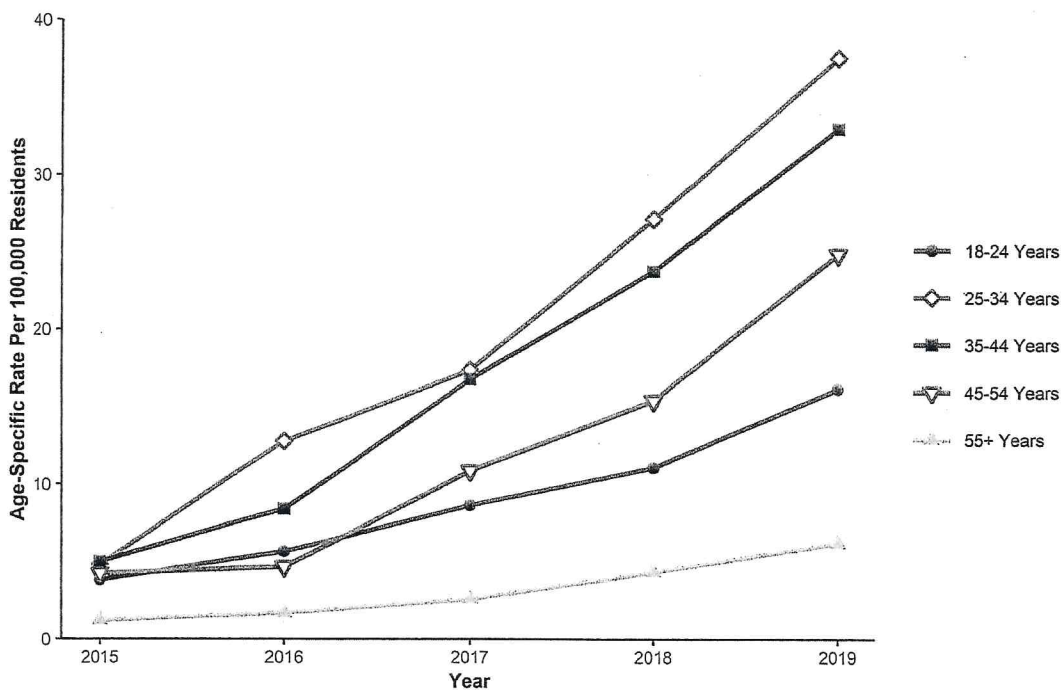
The price of Meth can vary widely, ranging from \$3 to \$500 per gram. Since most hits cost about \$5, and a gram contains about 4 hits, most grams cost between \$20 and \$60. A person with a severe Meth addiction could spend between \$12,775 and \$38,325 a year on Meth. Someone attempting to stop using Meth without supervision may experience a variety of severe, potentially fatal symptoms.



Fentanyl Overdose Deaths

The next few pages focus on overdose deaths involving fentanyl in TN. Fentanyl is a semi-synthetic opioid that is more powerful than both heroin and most opioid pain relievers, making it especially dangerous. While fentanyl can be legally prescribed, overdose deaths in TN primarily involve illicitly-manufactured fentanyl (IMF). Illicit (non-pharmaceutical) fentanyl has increased as a contributing substance in overdose deaths since 2015 in TN and over half (54.1 %) of the deaths involving fentanyl in 2019 were found to be polydrug. This rise in overdose deaths and number of deaths being reported as polydrug is likely due to fentanyl often being found mixed in with other illicit drugs (such as heroin, cocaine, or methamphetamine). Fentanyl in combination with other illicit drugs poses a high risk for overdose due to fentanyl's high potency.

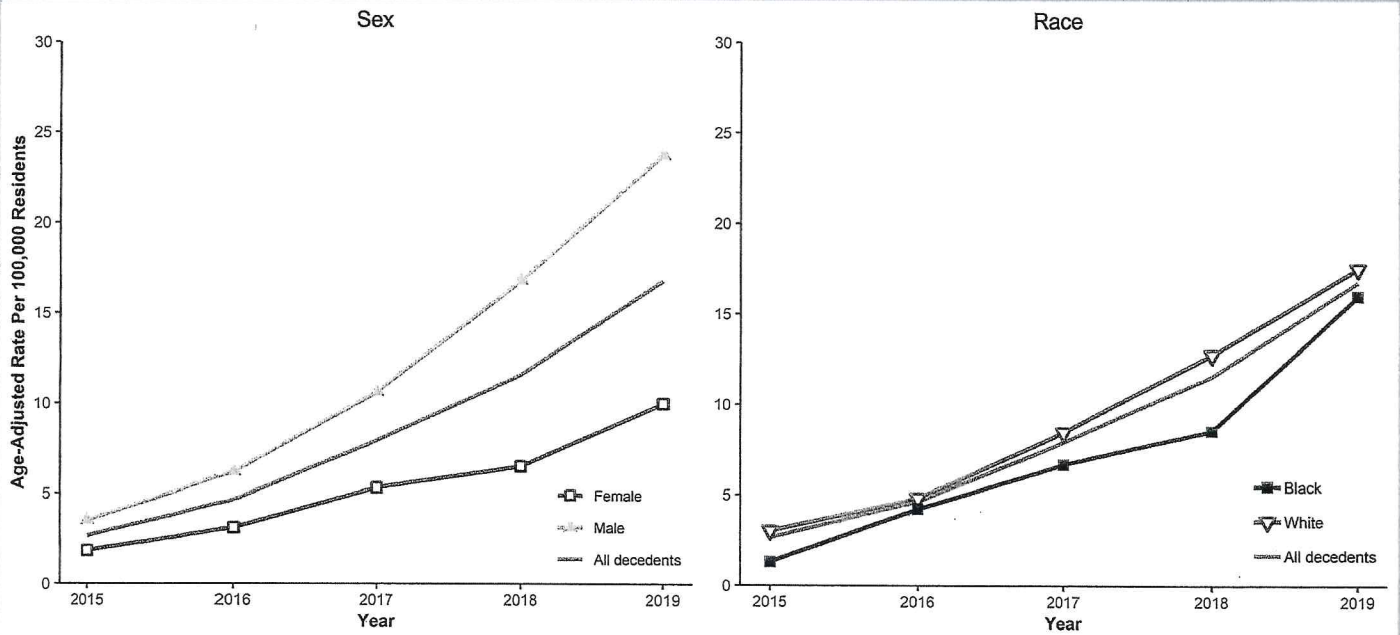
Age-Specific Rates for Fentanyl Overdose Deaths in TN, 2015-2019

The above graph displays age-specific rates for fentanyl overdose deaths in TN from 2015 to 2019. All age groups showed an increase in fentanyl overdose deaths between 2015 and 2019. Individuals aged 25-34 years had the highest overdose rates, increasing from 4.8 per 100,000 in 2015 to 37.6 per 100,000 in 2019.

The above graph presents age-adjusted rates for fentanyl overdose deaths by sex and race (Black and White) for 2015 to 2019. The age-adjusted rate for all decedents is included for comparison. Males had higher rates for all fentanyl overdose deaths, compared to females with increasing trends among both males and females. Rates for White Tennesseans were higher than Black Tennesseans for fentanyl overdose, with increases in both groups through 2019.

Overdose deaths in TN involving fentanyl increased by 46% between 2018 and 2019.
